Stay Hydrated:

 - Limit outdoor activities if wind chill conditions are extreme.
- Drive Safely:Check your vehicle's antifreeze levels and ensure all fluids are topped up.
 - Keep an emergency kit in your car, including blankets, snacks, and a flashlight.
- Keep a box of cat litter or sand in your car if you anticipate driving in the snow. It can be used to help get your car unstuck by providing traction.
 Be Prepared for Power Outages:
 - Stock up on essentials like non-perishable food, water, and blankets.
